



ONE PYP - TWO LANGUAGE COMBINATIONS

The ISB Dual Language Programme (English-German) is an addition to our Junior School Primary Years Programme (PYP) and is complementing our English Language Programme. Both programmes follow the <u>full PYP Programme of study</u>, a programme that ISB has offered since its foundation in 1979.

The Dual Language Programme is available to our youngest students (3 to 8 years old). It enables students to develop proficiency in both languages, therefore allowing students to better integrate with the local community.



A VALUABLE CHOICE FOR A WIDE RANGE OF STUDENTS

The Dual Language Programme suits the needs of a variety of students (and parents), including:

- Current ISB families who seek a stronger focus on both German and English
- Local or newly-arrived families in Basel who are looking for an International curriculum and want their children to learn in two languages (English and German)
- German speaking Swiss families who are looking for a greater exposure to English for their children, without losing German as an academic language



ABOUT THE PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAMME

The <u>Primary Years Programme</u> (PYP) is designed for students aged 3 to 11 (EC 1 to Grade 5). As part of the wider <u>International Baccalaureate</u> (IB) Programme, the PYP prepares students to become active, caring, lifelong learners who demonstrate respect for themselves and others and are well equipped to participate in the world around them.

The PYP provides a relevant, engaging and challenging educational framework, focused on the child's whole growth and development, encompassing their social, physical, emotional, academic and cultural needs.

THE DUAL LANGUAGE PROGRAMME IN PRACTICE

The Dual Language Programme, beginning offers students instruction in their first (home) language (English or German), while providing the opportunity to learn in and about a second (target) language.

Structure of Learning

Students in the Dual Language Programme receive instruction in English and German. Each Grade has two Dual Language classes and a team of **two full-time Teachers** (English and German) and **two full-time Teaching Assistants** (English and German). Students are greeted and settled in by the same two Core Teachers each day and will then transition to an English-language or German-language focus on alternate days. It is important to note that each class has one of their Core Teachers or Teaching Assistants with them at all times.

What is Waldkinder?

At ISB we partake in outdoor learning throughout the entire year and throughout all seasons and weather. Our weekly "Waldkinder" is an integral part of our curriculum, where the outdoors becomes our classroom! Learning in an outdoor environment allows children to interact with the elements around them and helps them to gain a deeper understanding of the world we live in. It is also an important way for our students to connect to our host country Switzerland's environment and make connections to the local community.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

The learning outcomes of the Dual Language Programme are in line with ISB curriculum continuums and match the English Language Programme class outcomes.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. Who is the Dual Language Programme most suitable for?

The programme is suitable for any students without diagnosed language difficulties. However, we recommend EC 3 - Grade 2 students should be proficient in either English or German.

2. Will my child in the Dual Language Programme learn the same curriculum content and concepts as those in the English Language Programme?

Yes, students will follow the same curriculum and content in both programmes, with students following the <u>IB PYP Programme</u> and doing the same Units of Inquiry.

3. What is the difference between a Bilingual and a Dual Language Programme?

Bilingual education is an umbrella term that refers to any programme with instruction in two languages. Dual Language education is a specific approach to developing language proficiency and literacy in one native language and one foreign language. It integrates native speakers of both languages for academic content instruction through both languages. Students maintain their native language while adding another language, and they develop pride in their own culture while developing an understanding of others.

4. Will my child be able to switch between programmes?

Students who request to move from the English class to the Dual Language class can apply to do so when they show proficiency in the languages. Students wanting to move from the Dual Language class to the English class can apply to do so and changes will be subject to school assessments.

5. Will there be a threshold of German language proficiency to join the Dual Language Programme?

There are no entry language proficiency requirements apart from EC 3 - Grade 2 students who need to be proficient in either English or German. It is, however, likely that as the programme extends to higher grades through the school, we will require students to have a minimum proficiency in English and German.

6. Will my child be able to receive Learning Support (LS) or English as Additional Language (EAL) when attending this programme?

Learning Support (in English) will be offered in both the English and Dual Language Programmes, while EAL support will be offered as part of the English Language Programme only.
